(General)

Point of the Assignment: To help you identify potential resources useful people who are recently unemployed, or otherwise without a regular paycheck, to meet needs.

Note: *This assignment is intended to supplement the “Managing Financial Responsibilities booklet” and should be completed with it in order to receive maximum benefit from it.*

Steps:

LOCAL COMMUNITY RESOURCES, EMERGENCY/SOCIAL SERVICES, FOR PROFIT COMPANIES, & MISCELLANEOUS

- **Your pension program** – For individuals who are near or over 50 years old, and have/had long-term employment, they should consider the possibility starting to collect on their pensions – as a source of stable income. This would be particularly helpful for individuals who have left their long-term employment, don’t have another job to replace it, and/or are not likely to get another job soon. There are financial and tax consequences, so be sure to do your homework, and find out the consequences of such a decision. Contact your pension administrator for information about retirement planning.
- **Community Action Partnerships** – Many county governments will have ‘partnerships’ that join with other agencies to provide resources, such as utility assistance payments. Check your county website for information on such programs.

In order for this process to be effective to you, you will need to review these resources:

- 1) *Take note of who they serve.*
- 2) *Identify what makes someone eligible for their resources.*
- 3) *Identify what resources they offer.*
